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SUMMARY

CMS VATAVARAN in collaboration with IUCN Commission on Education and Communication (CEC) organised the first Film Festival & Forum on LiFE (Lifestyle For Environment) in the state of Goa from 5th -7th March 2023 at Entertainment Society of Goa (ESG) and BITS Pilani, Goa. #NatureForAll, Wildlife Trust of India, Video volunteers, BITS Pilani Goa Campus, Vidnyan Parishad, Goa & the Assagao Mehfil also supported this program.

The Film Festival & Forum on LiFE in Goa commenced with an opening ceremony graced by the presence of the esteemed Chief Minister of Goa, Shri. Pramod Sawant. The event also featured a musical concert curated by Mr. Sandeep Srivastava, which showcased the talent of some of the most renowned artists from Goa. The festival spanned over two days, and the programs included captivating film screenings, insightful panel discussions, and a MOJO Film making workshop that emphasized the use of smartphones as a tool for environmental education. Additionally, the event focused on enhancing the role of youth in conservation and other crucial aspects of the environment & conservation.

Over the next two days, the Film Festival & Forum on LiFE in Goa featured thematic film screenings, panel discussions, and green filmmaking workshops held simultaneously. The films were screened on 6th and 7th March 2023, and each screening was followed by a thematic panel discussion. The screenings and panel discussions were categorized into four themes: Marine Conservation, Youth Engagement in Climate Change Mitigation, Water, Sanitation and Sustainable Lifestyle for Building Resilient Cities, and Nature Conservation for Climate Action. The discussions included open forum discussions with experts and regional filmmakers.

The four panels consisted of experts from various relevant fields, including policymakers, educators, and representatives from IUCN CEC. The panellists shared diverse perspectives and experiences, creating a vibrant and inclusive conversation. During the festival, a total of 22 national and international award-winning films were screened. These films covered a diverse range of environmental issues such as marine conservation, climate change adaptation and mitigation, wildlife conservation, water conservation, forest conservation, and sustainable livelihood. The festival was open to all, and over 700 individuals participated in this three-day event.









Pre-Inaugural Press Conference

On March 4th, a pre-inaugural press conference was held at Hotel Fortune Miramar Goa, Off Miramar Beach near Albamar Colony, Panaji to inform the media and press of the upcoming events in the three-day festival.

DAY TWO- 6th March 2023

The panel discussion "What Strategies Can Be Implemented to Overcome the Challenges of Human Activities on Marine Life?"

The panel discussion titled "What Strategies Can Be Implemented to Overcome the Challenges of Human Activities on Marine Life?" was held as part of the Film Festival & Forum on LiFE in Goa. The session was moderated by Dr. Vasanti Rao, CEC Regional Vice Chair South and Southeastern Asia and Co-Chair of Nature Education for Sustainability, Director General, Centre for Media Studies (CMS), India.

The panellists included Minal Desai Shirodkar, Assistant Professor of Zoology at Goa University, B.C Choudhury, Executive Trustee and the Principal Investigator of Aquatic Projects at Wildlife Trust of India, and Vatosoa Rakotondrazafy, CEC Regional Vice Chair for Eastern and Southern Africa.

The panel discussion focused on the impact of human activities on marine ecosystems and biodiversity and ways to overcome these challenges. The discussion covered topics such as sustainable fishing practices, responsible waste management, the role of governments and businesses in reducing negative impacts, the need for international cooperation, and the potential for restoration and conservation efforts to protect marine life for future generations.

Minal Desai Shirodkar shared her expertise in the field of biodiversity and conservation tourism as a strategy to promote conservation among BRICS countries. B.C Choudhury discussed his work in training wildlife managers and his role in various specialist groups such as the IUCN-SSC Marine Turtle Specialist Group and Crocodile Specialist Group. Vatosoa Rakotondrazafy shared her experience in advocating for small-scale fishers and her success in defending their rights in Madagascar.





The moderated panel discussion was followed by an open-ended Q&A session, allowing the audience to engage with the panellists and share their own insights and ideas. The session provided a valuable platform for experts to share their insights and best practices on Marine Conservation.

During the panel discussion, the experts discussed key topics related to marine conservation, such as the impact of human activities such as overfishing, plastic pollution, and climate change on marine ecosystems and biodiversity. They highlighted the importance of sustainable fishing practices and responsible waste management to protect marine life. Exhibition by WTI

The Wildlife Trust of India (WTI) is an Indian nature conservation organization committed to protecting wildlife and its habitat, and promoting conservation education and public awareness. WTI believes in providing holistic solutions to conservation issues through a participatory and inclusive approach. The organization also works towards rescuing and rehabilitating distressed wildlife, reducing human-wildlife conflict, and promoting sustainable livelihoods for local communities.

As a festival Program partner, during the festival, the WTI team displayed various outreach resources that showcased their campaigns, stories of conservation, and marine conservation. Program at BITS Pilani Goa Campus

A documentary film screening of Education on the Boat - A New Hope for Tomorrow by K M Taj Biul Hasan from Bangladesh was followed by a panel discussion on the topic of "How Can We Strengthen the Engagement of Youth in Climate Change Mitigation and Adaptation Efforts?"

The panel discussion featured renowned speakers from various fields. These speakers included Ms. Diana Garlytska, CEC Regional Vice Chair for West Europe and Co-Chair of Youth Engagement and Intergenerational Partnerships, Lithuania. Diana Garlytska, Co-Chair of the Steering Committee at Coalition WILD, is an expert in academia, teaching, and research work.

Geetha Bakilapadavu, Associate Professor at BITS Pilani, K.K. Birla Goa Campus, is known for her work in interdisciplinary areas of research. Sujit Dongre, Deputy Programme Coordinator, CEE, Goa, has extensive experience in environmental education, research, conservation education, and education for sustainable development. Dr. Solano Da Silva, Assistant Professor, Department of Humanities and Social sciences, BITS Goa, has conducted extensive research on land-use planning and alternative urban imaginaries. Radhika Mulay, Researcher, Centre for Water Research and Living Waters Museum, IISER, Pune, specializes in water science, policy, and management.

The session was moderated by Mr. Southey Sean, IUCN CEC Chair, who facilitated an engaging and informative discussion on the challenges and opportunities related to environmental sustainability and climate change mitigation.

The panel discussion focused on the role of Education for Sustainable Development (ESD) in empowering students and youth to tackle climate change and help shape the future of education in this critical area. The discussion covered key topics such as the role of education in raising awareness of climate change and its impacts, the importance of youth engagement and empowerment in addressing climate change, the role of technology and innovation in promoting sustainable development and mitigating the effects of climate change, the need for intergenerational collaboration and cooperation in tackling climate change, and the development of education and training programs that promote sustainable lifestyles and environmentally responsible behaviour.













Overall, the panel discussion provided valuable insights into the role of ESD in promoting sustainability and empowering students and youth to address climate change. It emphasized the need for cooperation and collaboration between different sectors and generations to achieve a sustainable future.

MOJO Filmmaking Workshop

The importance of awareness and education in the fight against climate change cannot be overstated, and the Environmental Mobile Journalism (Envi-Mojo) Youth Leaders program seeks to empower young people to inform and raise awareness about grassroots environmental issues. This was the aim of the two-day workshop conducted on March 6 and 7, 2023, during the Film Festival & Forum on LiFE in Goa. The workshop was facilitated by Ms. Purnima Damade, Senior Producer with Video Volunteers, and a total of 24 participants completed the program.

The participants were divided into five groups, and after training in short film making on conservation issues, they screened their individual group's movies. The training during the workshop included topics such as Fundamentals of Environmental/Conservation Filmmaking, how to make Environmental/Conservation films, Nuance of Visual Story Telling, and representing Data in the films.





The students were also given practical training in scripting, production, and post-production, including cinematography rules, on-location audio, and graphics, text, and subtitling.

On the second day, the participants were tasked with conceptualizing and producing short films with a maximum length of 180 seconds, which were then evaluated by the workshop facilitator and their peers. The completion of the workshop was marked with the conferment of certificates of completion to the participants by the esteemed guests present at the end of the festival.

The Envi-Mojo program is an important initiative that seeks to engage young people in the fight against climate change by providing them with the necessary skills and resources to raise awareness and inspire change. By incorporating environment and climate change-related themes into short films, the Envi-Mojo program has the potential to open up a new dimension to scientific ideas and interests, inspiring audiences to engage in a broader discussion of the issues at hand.





DAY Three- 7th March 2023, ESG

The third day of the festival was a success, with thematic film screenings followed by two panel discussions and a valedictory ceremony in the ESG auditorium. The screenings showcased award-winning films on water conservation and waste management from national and international levels, such as Water Contamination and Control, New City, Alternative Paths (Waste Management, REBELLIOUS WASTE, and Water Be Dammed).

A panel discussion on the interdependence of water conservation, sanitation, and waste management in building resilient cities followed the screenings.



The panel discussion included notable speakers from different fields. Ms. Tallulah D Silva, Founder/Principal Architect, Architecture T, Goa, specializes in cost-effective and sustainable architecture. She has also done research and pilot projects on greywater root zone systems and dry toilets as water conservation initiatives.

Mr. Shashwat Gupta Ray, Deputy Editor, Herald Group of Publications, Goa, is a multiple award-winning defence journalist with 20 years of experience. Ms. Margaret (Meg) Beckel, former CEO of the Canadian Museum of Nature, is an accomplished leader in the education, post-secondary, and arts & culture sectors.

The session was moderated by Mr. Luis Alberto CAMARGO, CEC Regional Vice Chair for South America and Co-Chair of Nature Education for Sustainability. Mr. Camargo is the founder and Director of the Organization for Environmental Education and Protection (OpEPA), a non-profit organization registered in Colombia and the USA, which has worked directly with over 120,000

children and youth and helped thousands of educators incorporate nature into their work. OpEPA focuses on the advancement of nature-based and regenerative education, heritage interpretation, and weaving.





The key topics discussed during the panel included the importance of water conservation, sanitation, and waste management in building resilient cities, the interdependence of these three elements in ensuring sustainable and resilient cities, the challenges posed by rapid unplanned urbanization on water conservation, sanitation, and waste management strategies, best practices for integrating water conservation, sanitation, and waste management strategies in urban planning and development, and the role of public-private partnerships and community engagement in promoting sustainable water and waste management in cities.

Each of the panellists addressed the participants individually and shared their experiences and knowledge on the topics discussed. The panellists were honoured with mementoes at the end of the session. Overall, the panel discussion provided valuable insights on how to effectively integrate water conservation, sanitation, and waste management strategies in building resilient cities.



The post lunch session of the third and last day of the festival began with a film screening of the award-winning documentary "Global Warning - Kashmir Chapter," followed by an insightful panel discussion on the topic of "How is conservation of nature linked to Climate Action?" The esteemed speakers in this panel were individuals who have dedicated their lives to environmental conservation and have made significant contributions to the field.

Firstly, Dr. Pradip Sarmokadam, Member Secretary of the Goa Biodiversity Board, shared his knowledge and experience as a former Jt. CEO of Digital & Environmental Solutions Pvt. Ltd, with an MSc in Ecology and Environment and a PhD in Coastal Pollution and Solid Waste Management. He has been working tirelessly to promote environmental sustainability in his community through training and CSR programs.



Secondly, Dr. Erach Bharucha, Director of Bharati Vidyapeeth Institute of Environment Education and Research, Pune, discussed his extensive work in implementing environmental education programs for schools, colleges, and the public.









He has won numerous awards for his contributions to the conservation of nature, including serving as Chairman of the Maharashtra State Biodiversity Board and working with the National Biodiversity Authority. His vast knowledge on wildlife and nature conservation, as well as the history of environmental management in India, made him a valuable addition to the panel.





Finally, Mr. Luis Alberto Camargo, CEC Regional Vice Chair for South America and Co-Chair of Nature Education for Sustainability, shared his insights on the topic. He is the founder and Director of the Organization for Environmental Education and Protection (Opena), a non-profit organization that has worked directly with over 120,000 children and youth, helping thousands of educators incorporate nature into their work.

The panel discussion was moderated by Mr. Sean Southey, IUCN CEC Chair. With over 30 years of experience in the development and communications field, Sean has a multi-sector background and is deeply committed to community empowerment and using creative media to facilitate social change.

The discussion touched upon several key topics related to biodiversity conservation and climate change mitigation. One of the key topics discussed was how biodiversity conservation can contribute to reducing greenhouse gas emissions and enhancing carbon sequestration. The experts explained how preserving and restoring natural ecosystems like forests, wetlands, and grasslands can help in reducing carbon emissions and increasing carbon sequestration, thereby contributing to climate change mitigation.

Another topic discussed was the challenges of integrating biodiversity considerations into climate change policy and action. The panelists highlighted the need for integrating biodiversity into climate policies and the challenges involved in doing so. They also discussed the importance of creating awareness among policymakers and the public about the interlinkages between biodiversity and climate change.

The experts also discussed the best practices for linking biodiversity conservation and climate change mitigation at the local, national, and international levels. The panelists emphasized the need for collaborative efforts among different stakeholders, including governments, NGOs, local communities, and businesses, to promote sustainable development and biodiversity conservation.



Audience Interaction

Throughout the festival, students, guests, and civil society were actively engaged in discussions about various films and environmental issues related to those films. After each screening session, there was a Q&A session where the audience could ask questions and share their thoughts.







One film that sparked a lot of discussions was "Peng Sa Yu", which shed light on the problem of illegal poaching of manta ray sharks. Many in the audience were shocked to learn about the magnitude of the problem and the impact it has on the marine ecosystem. In recent years, with increasing social awareness and interest in marine science, there has been an increase in reporting of stranding incidents of marine species in the media. In an effort to systematically document such marine stranding incidents along the entire Goa coastline and to support rescue and release of live marine cetaceans and turtles, IUCN India (under their Mangroves for the Future regional initiative), in partnership with Terra Conscious, the Goa Forest Department and Drishti Marine initiated a set of capacity building workshops for lifeguards and forest guardswhich led to the establishment of a Marine Wildlife Stranding Network, Ocean Watch - Goa, a pioneering public-private collaborative, structured network which provides comprehensive and continuous monitoring of the coast of Goa. The one year report of the stranding network has now been launched and is available online.
















CMS VATAVARAN Social Media Coverage






